PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Affordable Housing: The next Parish Council meeting is on Tuesday 16th Sept at 7.30pm in the Committee Room of the Stuart Memorial Hall. At this meeting Julia Mackie, Area Programme Manager for the Rural Housing Trust will be giving a presentation on affordable housing. This has been a topic of conversation in the village for some time so this could well be of interest to many people.

Trees, Hedges and Grass Verges: At the last meeting the pruning of trees and bushes overhanging the A1 footbridge paths and the paths leading into Church End was noted as being necessary, as was the cutting of grass verges especially down Station Road towards the old station. The Council agreed to follow this up. Villagers are again asked to make sure that their own hedges and trees do not overhand paths. Thanks to those who have already attended to this!

Playground equipment : The playground equipment has been safety checked and the council will follow this up with further maintenance. The old swings in Church End are to be replaced.

Noticeboard: The position of the notice board in Station Road was commented on as not being in the best position. Suggestions are sought from villagers as to a better place. Grants are being spent on footpath improvement in Church End, and the Council is seeking further improvement work to be done in Station Road.

Minutes: Full Parish Council meeting minutes are available from the Parish Clerk and are to be found on the Tempsford website and on the Notice boards.

St Peters Church - what next?

One of the biggest changes this month for Tempsford and Little Barford is the loss of someone who never lived in either village - the Rector, Rev. Barbara Ebeling, for 9 years a resident of Gt Barford, has retired and returned with husband, Chris, to their former home in Hunsdon, in the south-East of the Diocese.

As "Goodbyes" have been said [and with four parishes and four schools as well as many varied institutions/activities, there have been many] voices have been heard enquiring, "What happens to the parish church now?" The answers for the long term are never clear, but in the short term there are definite answers!

Firstly, *the business of the church continues!* Generally, services will be held as before on a rota basis with the other parishes in the Benefice, which means two services a month in St Peter's and always a service of Eucharist in at least one of the four active churches while the festivals, and special services twice a year at St Denys' Little Barford, will also take place. The four Parochial Church Councils will continue to function, those of Blunham and Gt Barford and Roxton led by their Churchwardens who are meeting regularly to ensure the smooth functioning of the Benefice. St Peter's has no churchwardens at present, but the PCC continues and two representatives attend the churchwardens' meetings.

Neighbouring clergy have volunteered to cover Baptisms and Weddings and may be contacted via any PCC member or the new Benefice administrator, Mrs Sue Mugridge on 01767 640 326. Funerals will be co-ordinated by our Reader, Mrs Brenda Jennings [01480 213 155] and all the local undertakers will contact her when needed. Mrs Jennings or any of the local clergy will give support as needed, including home or hospital visits.

As soon as the Benefice is technically vacant, from 1st September, talks will be held with senior clergy from St Albans Diocese to discuss what Benefice members would want of a priest and then see if there is a suitable candidate to fill the post.

Finding someone may take a while but it is hoped by all that the interregnum will be a short one and St Peters can soon start a new chapter in its long history.

Chat Club

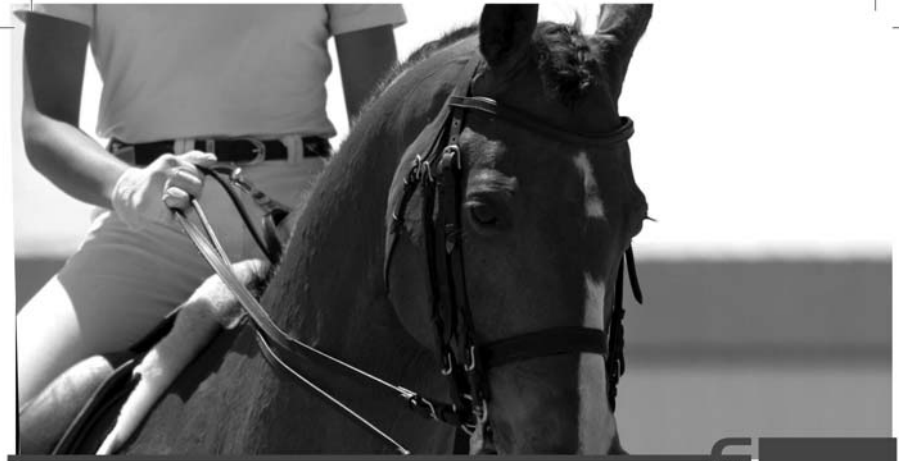

WHERE DID THE SUMMER GO?

The summer of 2008 seems to have been a pretty mediocre affair. It certainly wasn't as wet as last year when we had the three wettest months of the year in June, July and August. But 2008 has still been wetter than average with over six inches of rain recorded in the summer months up to 18th August. The temperatures have been about average: 18.5 °C in June, 22°C in July and 21°C in August, but apart from an odd week in June and a spell at the end of July and the start of August there have been few heat waves. Even when it was hot (July 28th was the hottest at 28°C or 82°F), it was not always sunny, and the hottest days were spoiled by some very high humidity making it cloudy at times. The hottest day with 28°C is the lowest of the hottest days that I have recorded for 20 years.

Unfortunately as we move into September and the hours of daylight decrease the chances of getting really hot weather also decline, but with September could be a much improved month weather-wise than its three predecessors—fingers crossed!

LEN HARRIS 30.7.1918 - 22.4.2008

Len was born in Richmond Avenue in Islington London, the 7th of 9 children, 6 brothers and 2 sisters; he is survived by his youngest brother Ted. He met his wife Grace when they were helping to teach ballroom dancing in the same dance school in London. When war was declared Len was the first one in his family to volunteer. He joined the British Expeditionary Force based in Guildford and was immediately sent to France. In March 1940 he had four days leave so he and Grace decided to get married. They were married on 12 March 1940 at Islington Town Hall, the first couple to be married on the new 24 hour soldier's licence, hence their photograph was in all the daily papers and many magazines.

On being rescued from Dunkirk he was found to have contracted tuberculosis and so had to leave the army and was sent to Papworth Hospital to recuperate. To enable Grace to visit him she lodged at a farm in Tempsford where Len's mother had been brought up, and still had friends. After his recovery they decided to stay in Tempsford and had two children, Ian and Christine. Ian unfortunately died aged 8. Len loved village life and especially his garden in which he used to grow all the vegetables for the family and many flowers as well. After Grace died in 1994 he continued to live in Tempsford still tending his garden and fending for himself. In 2001 he had a small stroke and moved into a warden controlled flat. The last place he lived was Blenheim Court in Kempston.

He will be remembered for his love of a glass of Guinness at eleven each morning whilst he read the daily paper. He enjoyed playing cards and dominoes and watching Countdown. He also took part in many activities at Blenheim Court including keep fit and games afternoons. He will be greatly missed by his daughter, grandchildren and great-grandchildren, but will have been pleased that he did not have to spend his last days in a care home.

STUART MEMORIAL HALL

We plan to close the hall for one week at the end of September whilst the floors of the committee room, the stage and the main hall are re-furbished. You may have noticed that despite the sterling efforts of our cleaner, the hall floor never seems to look clean and after refurbishment we believe it will look much smarter and be resilient to normal heavy traffic.

We have now made a modest contribution reducing the nation's energy consumption – and our ongoing costs - by replacing all the significant bulbs in the hall with low energy equivalents. A minor side effect of this has been that we have had to replace the dimmer switch in the Committee Room with a conventional switch. The new bulbs might take a minute or two to get to their full output, but once fully bright, you will not be able to tell the difference.

Regular users of the hall include two line dancing clubs, yoga classes, a pilates class, a dance school and two theatre clubs, as well as village organisations such as the Parish Council and the WI.
