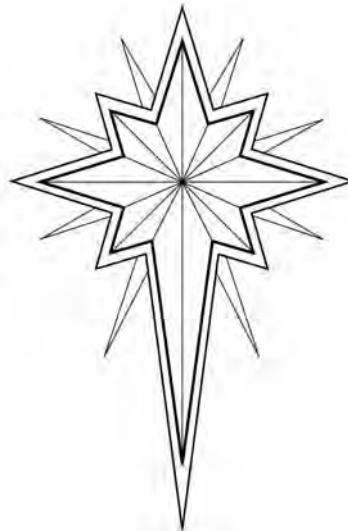

## **PARISH COUNCIL NOTES**

The Parish Council last met on September 28th, and the following is a summary of items that were discussed. Full formal minutes are available from the clerk, or on the village website.

### **Village Matters**

**Smokers:** A letter has been received from Keirs assuring us of their support for keeping the village clear of cigarette ends.

**River Footbridge:** Some repairs have been carried out to the footbridge over the river, but some hazards remain. The Council is pursuing the safe completion of this matter.

**Business at the old station:** Concerns were raised over a recent notice in the Biggleswade Chronicle for a licence to conduct business at the old goods-shed at the old station. The need for the application was a result of a VOSA inspection. The Chairman had met with the owner of the business to discuss the situation and express the fears of parishioner that traffic would increase. The owner explained that the licence was needed for lorries to be parked up overnight and which would therefore reduce the number of lorry movements since it would remove the need to take the lorries away at night and bring them back in the morning. The Council accepted this explanation and will monitor further business developments there.

### **Play areas**

The repairs to the Fort at Church End have now been satisfactorily completed. The swings are in need of painting and Cllr Cooney has purchased the paint. A date is to be arranged with Councillors to start this work. Some trees need to be cut back in the Station Road play area. The grass at Station Road play area is very kindly being cut by a neighbour.

### **Planning**

As a response to a recent application missed the deadline for return, the Council is asking Central Beds for plans to be sent out and responses to be submitted on-line. This is an attempt to reduce the time it might take for plans to be circulated round the council.

### **Cemetery Matters**

A working party is to be set up to cut back the overgrown trees and shrubs in the Churchyard. A review has been carried out checking the cemetery plots against the parish records. The plots in the new part of the Cemetery accurately cross-check with the burial books, however the old section is a cause for concern as there are some names listed in the burial books for which the plots cannot be found in the Cemetery.

Councillor Steve Cooney is to arrange for a detailed map to be drawn up and the names to be plotted onto the map. The Clerk is to enter these into new burial books that have been purchased.

A letter was received from a member of the public commenting on the good job being done by "In-Trim Grounds Maintenance" in the cemetery and churchyard areas; these comments were good to receive and will be passed on to the contractor.

### **Highways**

The Highways Department is to be contacted about items that have not yet been completed from a previous survey. A survey is to be made of the signage in the village; there are some junctions which are not clearly indicated.

### **Finance**

The Council is reviewing its spending patterns over the recent years in the light of the present economic climate and in preparation for the setting of the precept for the next financial year at the next Council meeting.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Tuesday Nov 16th at 7.30pm in the Stuart Memorial Hall .

In the seventieth anniversary year of the Battle of Britain much has been said in praise of 'the few' – the mainly young pilots who fought for the freedom of much of Europe. Yet behind those brave young men was a vast number of others, whose stories may never be told – engineers, for example, who kept the planes air-worthy. At Tempsford airfield there were about 1000 personnel, who worked around the clock, supporting covert operations which sought to assist resistance movements in occupied Europe. Every person played their part and for some the ultimate sacrifice was required. But their success rested upon the co-operation of each different part of the organisation and the discipline of its members. In many cases the odds against success were enormous and great resourcefulness was needed – as was also the case on a wider scale, as the country and its allies sought to pull together for the good of all. As we remember their sacrifices at our annual Remembrance services, we might also still learn from their examples.

The business of keeping small rural churches going is similar in some ways to a 'war effort'. The fewer people involved, the more difficult it is! But in a benefice of four (five with Little Barford) churches, where the vicar can only be resident in one of the four villages and four hamlets, team-work becomes even more essential if things are to run smoothly. It's surprising just how many jobs there are to be done in a church: from cleaning to maintenance, kitchen duties to fund-raising efforts. Add to these activities which are part of the actual worship, like singing in the choir or leading the prayers, assisting in the distribution of communion or providing the music and you start to get a feel for just how much there is to be done.

Obviously it is much better for everyone if there are enough people sharing the tasks – the smaller the congregation, the more onerous the whole enterprise seems! But in churches we have a scriptural model for our collaborative approach. In his first letter to Christians in Corinth, Saint Paul speaks of the Christian community as being the body of Christ on earth, with many limbs and organs, and in which each contributes according to their particular abilities. All are welcomed and valued, whatever time, talents and energy they are able to offer – and this is a foretaste of God's kingdom! From time to time we need to remind ourselves of how essential it is that we do whatever we can. While we

enjoy the blessing of peace-time, the church's mission – especially in a rural context - often seems like a battle, waged by a few unsung heroes; week in, week out they give unstintingly of themselves, recognising that the part they play is important, even if they don't think they have much to offer! Without them we would simply not survive. Thank you all – never forget how much you are needed and appreciated in the service of Christ in this area.

## **POLICE NEWS**

There have been several recent house burglaries in the East Bedfordshire area, with 2 in September and 1 in October in Tempsford, plus several others in the surrounding parishes. Bedfordshire Police suspect that these incidents may be linked and to combat this they are utilising an operation called Op PEAK which is a initiative to tackle and reduce burglary and other acquisitive crime by providing increased dedicated high visibility patrols and to use intelligence and investigation methods to catch those responsible. On the whole though, crime is down 32% compared to the same 3 month period last year.

Residents can also help to protect their own properties by increasing home security. This may be just ensuring that all doors and windows are securely locked, valuables are kept out of sight and timers are used on lights when they are not at home. Other security options are available, including a method called 'SMARTWATER', an innovative crime reduction tool designed to help protect property from thieves. Bedfordshire Police have bought the Smartwater technology as part of its 'Safer Homes' burglary reduction campaign to help the public protect themselves against crime. When placed under ultraviolet light the Smartwater liquid glows to reveal its unique chemical signature, which means stolen property can then be checked on a database and traced back to its owner. Police routinely screen all prisoners as they come into custody to check whether they have come into contact with Smartwater. Smartwater can be used for marking high value items from computers to jewellery, is invisible to the eye and cannot be removed. Clearly display warning labels in your windows, so that criminals know your property is protected.

Further information on Smartwater can be found on Bedfordshire Police's internet site that includes all types of advice on crime reduction and useful contact details for crime reduction information. If residents are concerned but do not have access to the internet, they can call Bedfordshire Police on 01234 841212 for advice, or the North Bedfordshire Crime Reduction team on 01234 275273.

I would also advise residents to contact the police immediately if they see any people or vehicles that they feel are suspicious.

## **ROSEMARY WELLS 1928—2010**

### **- an appreciation by Sandra Claughton**

Our family met Rosemary at St Peter's church in the mid-70's and I reckon we had over a thousand meetings over cups of coffee there as well as welcoming her as a most gracious guest to our house occasionally. We built up our own picture of her from her many stories as she was an interesting and willing raconteur.

We knew Rosemary as a very family-orientated person. She was the repository of her family's artefacts and she loved and supported all the generations, being often on the telephone to one or another. We saw her go, not only the extra mile, but hundreds of miles, visiting her ailing mother in Lt. Barford while she was living in London and later she regularly left St Peter's to drive to Lowestoft to visit an aunt, herself a spinster, as "Roey" aged, and would make a considerable detour if someone required a lift home.

We heard of growing up in many-roomed vicarages with large gardens, stories with a touch of Enid Blyton to them! We heard of happy days at church boarding school in Wells during the War and staying with nuns while she did her Theology degree in the austerity days of the mid-Forties. The Church and her faith were fundamental to Rosemary and moulded her life.

She spent time working with USPG, dealing with children's literature and made many overseas contacts. She was the Parish Worker in a hard-pressed parish in the North-East where she ran huge Sunday Schools and cycled miles in all weathers and even served coffee on the cold picket line during the Miners' Strike. Later she was a social worker in deprived Dockland where her clientele seemed often to be doughty old ladies who ran the gauntlet of the traffic in their slippers, waving a stick! Later still, she joined the children's department of Social Services in Huntingdon about which she was more reticent as it was "closer-to-home" both in mileage and in time. She drank thousands and thousands of cups of indifferent coffee and tea and ate a corresponding number of biscuits lovingly but not always hygienically served.

When the Wells family came to Tempsford in the Fifties, Rosemary was mostly living away and it was Christopher who bonded first with the village. By the time we met Rosemary she was commuting between her work in London during the week and her mother in Lt. Barford. She came regularly to

St Peter's at weekends and it was clear that by then she felt that Tempsford with Little Barford was her spiritual home. She worked tirelessly for St Peter's until she gave up her car last year and it was fitting that her last time in church was the St Peter's Day celebration in June when Bishop Richard came to dedicate the new altar frontal and re-dedicate the refurbished organ.

In her sixties, Rosemary bravely started her new job in Huntingdon and took on a mortgage and her house in Offord Cluny where she made herself very much at home and especially enjoyed having her own garden. It was during this time she and Jill Peters started the "T-Club" in Tempsford. This mid-week after-school club for 7 to 11 year olds with games and tea also had a "Sunday School" element and Rosemary continued to drive weekly from Offord right into her seventies, despite decreasing mobility, to meet this latest batch of "her" young people.

Rosemary just loved people! She could mix with folk at all ages and stages of their lives and had a wonderful understanding. She was undoubtedly "over-worked and underpaid" all her working life but she did it for love. She gave freely and generously of her time and her tithes, and, [only] when requested, would give thoughtful, pertinent and useful advice.

We have lost a gentle lady, a kind lady and a truly excellent friend.

Rosemary's funeral will be held at St Peter's on Tuesday, 2<sup>nd</sup> Nov, at noon.
